

Sporting updates

During Autumn 1, the Year 6 football team have been busy complete their league and cup games. The team have now played eight league matches and have participated in the Steven Tait Memorial Cup. Year 5 had an exciting opportunity to take part in an enrichment afternoon at Concordia Leisure Centre. The children took part in activities such as ten pin bowling and clip 'n' climb. Next half term, all children in Key Stage 2 will be taking part in a virtual multiskills competition and the Year 6 sports leaders will begin their training in preparation for spring and summer term.

<u>Celebrating learning from Autumn 1</u> Two Year Olds

The children in two year olds had a great start to the half term. Staff welcomed the new starters who have all settled well. They have enjoyed lots of sensory activities to encourage them to try new experiences. They have also been using language of texture. There have been lots of cooking activities, opportunities to develop control, use utensils and make choices based on their own preferences. There has also been a focus around imaginary and small world play to support the children in building relationships with their peers, developing language and their play skills. The two year olds had more opportunities to develop their fine and gross motor skills with large and small scale mark making. As always, there been focus around books and ensuring they are shared with the children as a group and on a one to one basis, this is fundamental in developing their language.



Next half term, the two year olds will be given lots more opportunities to extend their imaginary play in the small world area. They will be encouraged to use resources purposefully and to take an interest in others' play. The two year olds will be accessing the outdoors daily where they can use the bikes. This will develop their gross motor skills and their spatial awareness. They will also be able to play in the sand and the new role play kitchen. The children will be encouraged to engage at song and story time, join in with familiar words and actions and recall parts of their favourite books.

The lending library will resume each week and there will be a book to choose and keep for each child after every five posts on Tapestry to show them enjoying sharing their lending library books at home.

The following 10 texts are used continuously in two year olds. They inform a lot of the planning with links across the whole EYFS, and most importantly, repeating these texts impacts hugely on language development.

Nursery

Starting Nursery is a very exciting time for both children and parents as they begin their journey with us at Horton Grange. It can be a daunting time with lots of new faces, environments and leaving their grown-ups - often for the first time but the children have settled brilliantly and taken to Nursery life with a can-do attitude. During the first few weeks of term, the children were very busy getting to know their new friends, learning the Nursery routines and exploring the classroom environment.

Developing language skills is always a very important focus in Nursery and last term the children were naming new objects and toys around the Nursery.

When starting their topic, 'This is Me', the vocabulary focus changed to naming the parts of their body and what they use them for. The children have been using their senses to explore new sounds and smells, which has been tremendous fun! The knowledge organisers have supported the children to learn lots of new vocabulary and they have thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to use these new words in their play by conducting smell, taste and touch tests!

Next half term, as the weather begins to change and the leaves start to fall, the children in Nursery will be learning about the changes in the seasons and exploring the natural environment around them in Autumn! The children will be embarking on adventures to find Autumn objects and using the leaves to make comparisons and colour match. Nursery's topic focus will include naming lots of the natural treasures gathered on their Autumn walks during forest school.



Reception

It has been an incredible start to the year; the children quickly settled into the new routines and made the most of opportunities within the environment. They learned about different occupations within our community. This included a visit from West Hartford fire station where they learned about fire safety.




Reception began their reading journey and have been taught their first 25 sounds, they practised recognising them and writing them and made fantastic progress! In maths they learned about sorting and matching before moving on to learning about repeating patterns. They had lots of fun making new patterns in the maths challenge area.

The children were also able to get creative last half-term, they painted self-portraits and made salt dough faces which will feature in our


environment.

The class text will be 'Little Glow' by Katie Sahota. This book focuses on many celebrations that people around the world take part in.

Year 1

The Year 1 children have had a great start to Key Stage 1. They are settling well into their new routines and have learnt lots of new and exciting things.

In maths, the children have been learning all about numbers to 10 including ordering, finding one more and less, learning new mathematical language and getting to grips with our maths equipment.

There are some super mathematicians in Year 1! The children have been having fun practising their maths skills at home by playing on NUMBOTS. All children have login details in their reading records. Key Stage 1 will be competing for prizes and awards each term.

The children have enjoyed reading stories from one of their favourite authors, Julia Donaldson as well as traditional tales such as The Gingerbread Man and learning about non-fiction texts. They are great at retelling the stories and worked so hard to write their super sentences using 'Fred Fingers' to help them to spell.

In Art lessons, the children became artists and sketched portraits in the style of Julian Opie. Their artwork was amazing! Ask them to tell you what style of art Julian Opie creates!

The children loved learning lots of facts about animals in science. The teachers were very impressed that they could tell us facts about different mammals, fish and birds. They are great at using their knowledge organisers to support their learning. The children also learnt about the signs of Autumn and went on an Autumn walk around school, they found lots of colourful leaves!

Year 1 children had a fantastic morning at St Mary's Lighthouse. They learnt all about the wildlife and also climbed up 137 steps to the top. They loved the views from the top and could see all the way to Blyth.





Next half term in maths, children will be strengthening their number skills by learning to add and subtract numbers to 10.

In science, they will be learning about different materials and will become scientists when investigating the best material to make an umbrella.

The children will be learning about our local area in geography and will be designing and making a boat in DT. We will be testing them to see if their boats float or sink. Please donate any empty boxes, plastic bottles, pots etc for model making.

Please continue to read with your child at home. Children who read four times at home in a week can *go green for a custard cream!* Reading folders should be in school every day. Please return school library books so the children can swap them. Thank you for your support.

For their class texts in Year 1, the children will be exploring more stories including The Enormous Turnip and The Rainbow Fish. The children will be learning all about adjectives and use these to describe The Rainbow Fish.

Year 2

What a great start the Year 2 children have had. As always, the focus has been on improving basic skills in English and maths. In English, the children have worked on their letter formation, sitting letters correctly on the line, using appropriate finger spaces and the continuous improvement to presentation and handwriting. Teachers have already seen some gorgeous handwriting in Year 2! The children have read Little Red Riding Hood and have made simple changes to the original story. The focus this half term has been securing the children's understanding of basic

punctuation. They have enjoyed using adjectives and verbs when writing Autumn poems. They have also used time ordering words to write a set of instructions for a witches spell.

In maths, children have worked to secure their quick mental recall of number bonds and facts to 10 and 20. They have counted each day in 2's, 5's or 10's, which are the stepping-stones to them beginning to learn their 2, 5 and 10 times tables. The children have explored Place Value, using their toolkit, concrete equipment and picture representations to support their learning. They have used number lines, 100 squares, whole-part models and have enjoyed reasoning and problem solving.






In History, the children developed their understanding of chronology through their study of The Great Fire of London and The Gunpowder Plot. They looked at a range of sources and created a timeline of events. The children were particularly interested to find out about Samuel Pepys through the diaries that he wrote. They explored the similarities and differences between life in 1666 and present day. Please ask the children to talk to you about the differences. We have some very knowledgeable historians in Year 2. They even had a

visit from a firefighter who was very impressed with the knowledge of the children.

In science, the children have investigated Animals including Humans. They began with some revision from Year 1 of animal classification (mammal, reptile, amphibian, bird or fish) and animal diet (carnivore, herbivore or omnivore). Staff and children were very excited to welcome into school Angela's Ark a company that provided amazing workshops for children to find out what animals need to survive and about animal habitat and diet. The children were able to hold many of the animals and they asked some amazing scientific questions.







Next half term, in English, the children will read the text The Owl Who Was Afraid of the Dark by Jill Tomlinson. They will write an alternative version of the story called The Fish Who Was Afraid of the Sea. They will continue to improve their descriptions using adjectives. They will also use `and', `but' and `because' to extend their sentences.

In maths, the focus on basic skills will continue. All children should be able to count in 2's, 5's, and 10's. They should be confident with number bonds and facts to 10 and will be learning number bonds and facts to 20. They will begin the next unit on addition and subtraction and then move onto shape. In science, children will be exploring materials. They will go on a material hunt around their own classroom to identify objects and materials. Next, they will investigate the properties of materials. They will carry out different tests on a variety of materials and will gather and present their findings.

In geography, children will be exploring their own local area. They will be looking at and making their own simple maps using keys. They will use aerial view maps to locate local landmarks and identify human and physical features. They will also use atlases and globes to locate the seven continents and five oceans.

Year 2 end of day stories will be a range of fantastic books by author Julia Donaldson.














Year 3

Year 3 staff would like to start by saying how incredibly proud they are of the children in Year 3. They have all adapted to moving from Key Stage 1 to Key Stage 2 seamlessly and they have taken it all in their stride!

This half term, in Literacy, Year 3 have learned about fables and stories with a moral teaching. Of course the children read the classic The Hare and the Tortoise learning how sometimes slow and steady wins the race- a lesson we are

all learning now we are back at school. They focussed on the basics of getting each sentence structured correctly then moved on to adding noun phrases including adjectives. The children applied their knowledge, retelling the fable The Mouse and the Lion with the message Kindness is more powerful than strength. An important message for all. They then moved on to instructions and had great fun instructing everyone on how to wash a woolly mammoth. This involved focussing on adverbs and prepositions.



Place Value has been the hot topic in maths. The children have enjoyed using practical resources to make different numbers and partition them in different ways. This has included understanding how many hundreds, tens and ones are in a number and really developing their understanding of the number system up to 1000. The children also looked at addition and subtraction where they practised the fundamentals of number facts before moving on to adding and subtraction using the formal column method. This included numbers which go over a boundary so the children needed to know when to carry and when to exchange.



The thigh bone's connected to the...what was it again? Well Year 3 will be able to tell you! Last half term they learned all about their brilliant bodies focussing on the skeleton. Learning about the different types of skeletons animals and humans have, the children can tell you the difference between an endoskeleton, exoskeleton and a hydrostatic skeleton! They also investigated how the skeleton moves, using their biggest resource- their own bodies! They answered the enquiry question - do children with larger feet jump further? They had great fun finding out!





Travelling back 2.6million years ago to the earliest humans, Year 3 really enjoyed learning about the Stone Age through to the Iron Age. After addressing the misconception that the

Dinosaurs lived at the same time as people, (spoiler alert- they didn't) the children enjoyed discovering how people throughout the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age lived including; changes in diet, what homes they lived in and their daily life, comparing these between the time periods and to their life today. It's safe to say there have been a few changes however perhaps not as many as you would think! The highlight was definitely seeing the artefacts and holding a real mammoth bone from 10,000 years ago.

This half term, TT Rockstars was also reintroduced to the children and teachers have already started to see real engagement again both in and out of school. The engagement was fantastic and there are now eight Rock Heroes across school. To become one, you must answer times tables questions in studio in less than one second per question. But remember there are certificates for all the levels being handed out in KS2 assembly every other week. It's about progress, not being the fastest! Children have also been recognised for the most correct answers (across any games played) in each class each week with 10 E-praise points for each child in the lead. Children in KS2 should aim to play a few games each night to develop their recall of times tables. Please contact the school if you need any help with logins. Just a reminder of the game types on single player.

Next half term, in Literacy, Year 3 will be reading a favourite classic story The Iron Man. Focusing on the introduction, the children will learn how to create suspense and give just the right amount of description to hook in the reader. As always to help your child please read with them every night - the more they read, the better writers they become!

Multiplication and division will be the focus of Year 3 maths, beginning to use more formal methods to multiply and divide 2 and 3 digit numbers. To aid with this the children need to be confident with their times tables facts- especially the $2,5,10,3 \times 10^{-2}$



tables and understanding the inverse. For example, I know $5 \times 3 = 15$ so I also know $3 \times 5 = 15$, $15 \div 3 = 5$ and $15 \div 5 = 3$. All children have access to TTRS, which is a great computer programme to support you at home (same login details as Numbots)

In science, the children will be learning about rocks and fossils. They will be investigating how fossils are formed and delving deep into the different types of rocks, which are on our Earth.

Next half term, in geography, Year 3 will be learning about settlements and land use in the UK. The children will look at early settlements and why people settled where they did to current settlements, including trade links (a very current topic at the moment).

Year 3 will also be creating their very own bookmarks in Design and Technology using their sewing skills and focussing on gymnastics in PE- please ensure your child has the correct PE kit with them on a Monday.

Year 3 class text will be The Iron Man-Ted Hughes. As well as looking at the introduction of this wonderful classic in our Literacy lessons, we will be reading the full story at the end of the day. Melding science fiction with fairy tale, The Iron Man tells the story of a gigantic metal robot who appears out of nowhere, crashing onto the beach and shattering into many parts; he is discovered by Hogarth, a young boy. The Iron Man proceeds to devour farm machinery, until the farmers rise up against him.

Year 4

This half term, Year 4 really enjoyed their science learning about food chains. The children researched food chains from different animal habitats and were able to use key vocabulary such as consumer, producer, predator and prey to label the food chains. The highlight of this unit was Year 4's visit to Northumberland Zoo. The children encountered many different animals and had the chance to participate in a workshop about predators and prey. It was lovely to see the children putting their learning from science into a real life context and they all represented the school brilliantly during this new experience.





In History, the children learned about Ancient Greece. The children

used their maths skills to order dates on a timeline and found out what the Ancient Greeks for. In order to find out about the past, the children used the museum artefact box to explore different sources of evidence from the time period. They interpreted the artefacts by discussing what they were, who might have used them and why they were important to life in Ancient Greece.

In PE, the children enjoyed learning tag rugby where they developed their ball control, attacking and defending skills. The children were successful in applying these skills to small game situations and they were also able to demonstrate improved team work and communication.

Next half term, Year 4 are learning about the water cycle and rivers in geography. This unit also links to the children's science topic – states of matter. In English, the children will read and write historical fiction in English to link back to their previous learning on Ancient Greece. In maths, the children are developing their knowledge of addition and subtraction and learn the 6, 7 and 8 times tables.

Their class text will be Year 4 will read A River by Marc Martin. This poetry book is about the water cycle and how humans can impact upon rivers. The text links to the children's learning in geography and science.

Year 5

This half term, the children dived into the Anglo Saxon era through their history lessons. They enjoyed a trip to Jarrow Hall, where they experienced what life was like in an Anglo Saxon village and learnt about crime, gruesome punishments and fierce battles of the era. In Literacy, they also studied the Anglo Saxons as they read and wrote their own version of the myth Beowulf and wrote a report about the levels of society in the Anglo Saxon era.





In maths, the children built on their knowledge of place value by exploring numbers up to 1 million, including rounding numbers to different degrees.

In science, the topic of Earth and Space really gripped the children's imaginations. The children have learned all about the planets in our solar system. They were shocked to learn that Jupiter and Saturn have so many moons, and how our Moon and the Earth move around the Sun. Additionally, they have broadened their scientific vocabulary extensively.

In art, the children studied the artist L.S. Lowry and looked at his use of pen in his drawings. They used pens to explore texture and tone, and then used acrylic paints to create their own Lowry inspired landscape painting, based on the beach huts at Blyth.

In PE, the children have enjoyed starting their swimming lessons in addition to building their netball skills. The children have been working on their passing, shooting and defending skills over the half term and they loved taking part in some mini netball tournaments against each other.

In Music, they have explored the features of rock music, listening to various rock songs and focusing on Livin' on a Prayer by Bon Jovi. They have learnt to sing the song and used glockenspiels to perform, improvise and compose music to accompany the song.

Next half term, the children will be learning about the countries and cities of South America in geography. Learning will be based around physical geography where the children will learn about Climate Zones, Biomes, and Vegetation Belts.

In DT, the children will develop their cooking skills by making their own homemade pizzas, based on what they learn about using seasonal ingredients.

In science, the children will begin a chemistry unit - Property of Materials. They will take part in investigations to compare and group materials on the basis of their properties.

In music next half term, the children will explore Jazz music. They will listen and appraise jazz tunes, take part in musical activities and also perform and share their own compositions.

As well as focusing on multiples and factors in maths children will continue to work on their times tables. It is important for children to also practise these at home. The end of year times tables expectation for Year 5 is for the children to be rapid at recalling all multiplication and division facts up to 12 x 12.

The class text next half term they will read an explosive, thrilling, action packed story called Stormbreaker- Alex Rider to support their learning in English lessons.

Year 6

It was fantastic to welcome the children back in September and they have got off to a flying start in Year 6. They have become accustomed to the increased pace of learning and we have noticed some superb role models for the rest of the school with exemplary behaviour.

The children have enjoyed listening to radio broadcasts online of our class text, The Machine Gunners by Robert Westall and have also written their own historical fiction based on both this book and their learning in history lessons which have focused on the impact of war on Blyth. This topic has been very popular and helped the pupils to include authentic historical detail to their creative writing. We were also very lucky to have the Time Bandits visit us in school and share more information and real artefacts from World War II. The children had many excellent questions and learned a lot from the session.



Year 6 children have also learnt how to use formal persuasive language

in a letter to Mrs Irving in order to apply for a Year 6 job which will involve the increased level of responsibility that we expect to see them developing as they get closer to moving on to secondary school.

Reading is always a huge focus and, in school, children have a reading book, a library book and a range of books from which to choose within the classroom. We have a new reward system in which children reading at home can be awarded stickers and badges. Well done to those who have already read 25 times at home and achieved their bronze sticker! Children are also accessing Reading Plus in class which helps to build fluency and speed with reading. They can access this on computers at home – well done again to all who are already doing this! Please encourage your child to use this programme at home as we have seen fabulous progress achieved by those who go that extra mile! This also goes for Spelling Shed and TT Rockstars.

In maths, the children have been learning about place value working with numbers up to 1,000,00 and have now moved on to extending their learning in addition and subtraction.

In science, Year 6 studied the digestive systems of humans and animals, discovering that cows have four stomachs and regurgitate their food! The children thoroughly enjoyed carrying out an investigation on how water moves around the body. To do this experiment, they placed jelly snakes in three different types of liquid: plain water, salty water and very salty water. They found out that water will always travel to where hydration is needed.

Next half term, Year 6 will be consolidating the learning that the children acquired during the residential visit to Hawse End in the Lake District and extending it further. They will learn about the features of mountainous areas and economic activity in the Lake District and also study Ordinance Survey maps, learning about six figure grid references and contour lines.

In English, they will be working on contemporary fiction and newspaper reports, revising some of our learning on the impact of war from Autumn 1 by studying the Christmas Truce of 1914.

In science, Year 6 will be learning about evolution, the findings of Charles Darwin and fossils. In RE, we will be studying the Hindu faith and learning about how to edit images in computing.

The Year 6 class text will be The Last Wild by Piers Torday. This text is all about animals, which will link to some of our work in science.
